Bird Hide Project

Behind the scenes Peter Ehrlich has been working on the Bird Hide Project with other community organisations to build a facility which will allow locals and visitors to watch birds in their natural wetland habitat on the waters edge at Cooney Reserve, without disturbing them.

On Saturday 5 November a Godwit Welcome Festival was held at the reserve, and saw the unveiling of the plans for the Project. The project includes a twenty metre boardwalk - a major hide structure

that will accommodate larger groups, offering near 360 degree views – a minor hide nearby – and a very substantial and impressive entrance sculpture of a godwit. Significant funding has already been secured, with additional funding applications underway. The Menzshed will construct the hide, dismantle it, and then reassemble it on site. Anybody keen to join in and help bring this community project to life is most welcome to lend a hand.

Container Project Update - Paul Zeeders

Your committee has been quietly working in the background to get the container project back on track. We went back to the grants people to get our grants reapproved as we had



changed the companies that we were purchasing goods from. The first stage of this project was completed some time ago with the arrival of 2 containers. The next stage is the ground works making the site ready for the concrete pad. You will see this happening next week with the relocation of the containers clearing the site ready for the bobcat to come in. Over the coming months we will have the concrete pad poured and the erection of the canopy between the two containers. We will be purchasing engineering tools to fit out our new metal work area with the major ones being a plasma cutter as well as a metal bandsaw. The last stage will be running 3 phase cabling from the 2nd workshop out to the container as well as a water supply. Please respect the worksite as we will have various trades people working in our normal area. We will try to keep the disturbance to a minimum. If you have any questions, Richard Wilde and Rob Lyons are our site contacts for this project.
